Invitational Competition	<ul> <li>An invitational competition for high performance athletes.</li> <li>To increase participation at the Canadian Surf Lifesaving Championships.</li> <li>Hosted by the Lifesaving Society Nova Scotia.</li> <li>Sanctioned by the Lifesaving Society Canada.</li> </ul>				
	Event rules in accordance with Section 4 of the 2015 – 2019 ILS Competition Rule Book, revised 2017.				
Program of Events	<ul> <li>The Canadian Lifeguard Challenge is 3 consecutive Oceanwoman/Oceanman rounds.</li> <li>Round 1 is a traditional Oceanwoman/Oceanman course. The order of legs is ski – board – swim.</li> <li>Round 2 is an M-shaped Oceanwoman/Oceanman course. The order of legs is swim – ski – board.</li> <li>Round 3 is a traditional Oceanwoman/Oceanman course. The order of legs is board – swim – ski.</li> <li>The time between each round is predetermined. See detailed schedule for times.</li> <li>Males and females compete on the same course. The male and female Oceanman/Oceanman rounds shall be run consecutively. See schedule.</li> </ul>				
Eligibility for an Invitation to Participate	<ul> <li>To be eligible to compete in the Canadian Lifeguard Challenge, competitors shall:</li> <li>Hold a current (within 24 months of the date of certification) Lifesaving Society Bronze Medallion, Bronze Cross or National Lifeguard certification (any option).</li> <li>Be a registered athlete with the Lifesaving Society Canada.</li> <li>Finish in the top 16 places of the Open Division Oceanwoman/Oceanman event at the 2018 Canadian Surf Lifesaving Championship (CSLC), or</li> <li>Finish in the top 3 places of the Youth Division (15 – 18 years) Oceanwoman/Oceanman event at the 2018 Canadian Surf Lifesaving Chandian Surf Lifesaving Championship (CSLC).</li> <li>Eligible athletes will receive an invitation to compete in the Canadian Lifeguard Challenge to be held on August 4, 2019.</li> </ul>				









Starting Position	For each round, starting position shall be determined by random draw. Starting positions shall be consecutively numbered from the left (facing the water) starting with the number 1. Competitors must commence craft legs from the correct allotted beach positions. The starting positions are reversed for the board and surf ski legs. F example, in a 16-competitor race in which a competitor has drawn position 1: the competitor commences the initial craft leg from position 1 but commences the other craft leg from position 16.							otted egs. Numbering	Release form by July 15, 2019.					
	Competitors are required to have their competitor number applied to their upper left and right arm and upper left and right thigh.					
Attire	<ul> <li><u>Swim Caps</u> <ul> <li>Caps, securely fastened under the chin, must be worn on the competitors' heads at the start of each event and round.</li> <li>Rubber or silicone caps may be worn under ocean competition caps.</li> </ul> </li> <li><u>Vests</u> <ul> <li>Canadian Lifeguard Challenge vests must be worn by competitors. These vests must be worn over the top of swimwear, PFDs, protective clothing and/or wet suits.</li> <li>Vests will be provided to all competitors and become the property of the competitor at the end of the competition.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>					
	<ul> <li>Wetsuits are permitted only in water temperatures of 16°C or less.</li> <li>Wetsuits must be worn in water temperatures 13°C or less.</li> </ul>					
Equipment and Handlers	Competitors must provide their own craft. Craft must meet ILS specifications.					
	Competitors must have an equipment handler who is knowledgeable in the event rules and their role as an equipment handler.					
	Equipment handlers must wear a competition cap matching that of their competitor.					
	Handlers need not wear a vest.					
	Competitors are required to have their craft ready in the designated position prior to the start of the race. The start of each round shall not be delayed if competitors' equipment is not available or not in position. Each round shall start at the predetermined, designated time.					








